Living the rest of the story

In the Gospel of Mark, Jesus has come exclusively to proclaim the good news to people everywhere. He begins his ministry in the synagogue of the small Galilean town of Capernaum, where he casts out an unclean spirit from a Jewish man on the Sabbath day. He then crosses the street, where he casts a fever out of Simon Peter's mother-in-law, who gets up from her sickbed and serves the Sabbath meal.

That's how it begins, this proclamation of the good news. The Kingdom of God draws near in word and deed to people whose lives center around worship and faithfulness. People around him are healed and freed for service, whatever that might be.

His ministry is a continual string of teaching,

preaching, and casting out unclean spirits of every sort: those that cause mental illness, physical illness, separation, and distortions of both thinking and self-worth. He fishes for people, beginning close to his Jewish home and spiraling ever outward to outcasts, Jewish people from Galilee to Jerusalem to all of Judea, and Gentiles from 10 cities, catching them all in his net of grace, love and mercy. His expanding ministry is clearly meant for everyone. Jesus' story in the gospel of Mark ends with a rigged trial, execution on the cross, an empty tomb, and a call to meet him again in Galilee. The gospel itself ends with women gathered at Jesus' tomb, stunned into silence. Here we have no witnesses to his rising, no stories of him appearing to his disciples, no follow-up to the emptiness of the tomb. Mark's readers and hearers are simply provoked by a story that ends with an unfinished sentence: "They said nothing to no one; they were afraid because..."


We who hear this account of Jesus' ministry, death, and resurrection are challenged: Will Jesus' words and deeds fall into obscurity in our time, or will we live the rest of the

story? We like the women at the tomb stand in stunned silence as we witness many things: the demands of our personal lives; the politics of our city, country, and world; the provocation of the empty tomb and the call of the Church.

Will we say "nothing to no one"? Or will we risk telling the story and living in ways consistent with God's Beloved Son, who proclaimed good news in word and deed everywhere

> he went, even at the cost of his own life? These are the questions of Lent.

How we answer reveals our Christian commitment, the strength and weakness of our faith; the need for study, prayer, fasting, charitable giving, and discernment; and the extent of our connection to Jesus' beloved community, the Church.



Wherever the start of Lent finds you this year, let its end find you at the foot of the cross, in adoration of the One who gave everything he had and everything he was in order to bring healing to people everywhere, including you. Make the most of Lent by studying and praying daily, attending the Shrove Tuesday pancake supper, Ash Wednesday service, Thursday mid-week services, and Sunday services. Don't miss Holy Week, as we live out Mark's story of the last week of Jesus' life. It is a full worship experience from February 14 through April 1; if you give it time and attention, Jesus himself will transform your heart and mind. He will help you live the rest of the story.



Shrove Tuesday Pancake Party



This tradition has given rise to some well-known regional parties, such as Mardi Gras in New Orleans and Carnival in Rio de Janeiro, as people found ways to use the abundance of foods and drinks considered inappropriate for consumption during the days of Lent.

The day before Ash Wednesday is often called "Mardi Gras" (Fat Tuesday), "Shrove Tuesday", or even "Pancake Tuesday", as it has become associated with a simple food that can be dressed up with nearly anything fat or sweet found in the common kitchen.

We too have such a party. On February 13, we'll feast on pancakes, sausage, applesauce and some decadent delights as we purge our own kitchens in preparation for Lent. But this is no ordinary pancake supper. 




Catherine, our Minister of Music, is thrilled to announce that she has been accepted to the Banff Musicians in Residence program from January 28th to February 10th at the Banff Centre.

The Banff Musicians in Residence (BMiR) program provides emerging and established artists from the classical, jazz, singer songwriter, folk, pop, electronic, and world music traditions with a period of focused time to concentrate on artistic development. Residents are given the opportunity to expand their artistic insights through interaction with program peers and visiting artists. Participants have the freedom to structure their time around the needs of their own individual project, to interact with peers who are also participating in the program, and to use the beautiful resources and facilities at the world-acclaimed Banff Centre.

Catherine's research project will focus on repertoire study. She will be preparing a paper / interest focusing on a historical perspective of Treble Choir repertoire by Canadian composers that she will present at the national conference of Choral Canada in St. John's Newfoundland at the end of June. She also intends to focus her time to research new repertoire in general, and on music of the Venetian Oespedali.

This work will benefit the singers in ALL of Catherine's ensembles including both Cantaré Children's Choir and EL-COC choir.



The Agape Café


The Agape Cafe is a free 4-course dinner and evening of entertainment brought to you by the Church of the Cross youth group.



... Bishop's Messege

Dear Beloved of God -

In the fall of 2017 I was privileged to participate, among other events, in three Common Prayer Services with the Roman Catholics, and with Anglican presence and participation, in Calgary, Edmonton and Whitehorse.

The Common Prayer Services were meaningful in their hopefulness, in a moving forward together, and in their commitment through five ecumenical imperatives. Regularly, over the course of the next year I will be briefly reflecting on these imperatives via this monthly newsletter article.

Ecumenical Imperative 1: Catholics and Lutherans should always begin from the perspective of unity, and not from the point of view of division, in order to strengthen what is held in common, even though the differences are more easily seen and experienced.

Each of the Common Prayers Services was a sign of this unity. Catholics and Lutherans (and Anglicans) gathered to commemorate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. These were solemn events, cognizant of the pain between our two churches over the centuries, of the pain in families and communities. They acknowledged the are- Won't you join me? as where we need to repent our arrogance, our certainty that we and only we are right.

But each also joyously affirmed our oneness in Christ. Through scripture, through prayers, through music, through homilies (yes, in Edmonton and Whitehorse there were two sermons!), we celebrated and pledged to find more ways to focus on our oneness. In reflecting on the powerful impact of the service, many people said, "Oh, we have to do this again!"

The services were built around the Five Ecumenical Imperatives that are part of the Lutheran-Catholic "From Conflict to Communion" project. It doesn't take a large group of people in an imposing Cathedral or a group of pastors in a hotel conference room to discuss the imperatives. You can do it with your congregation, you can do it in groups of 2 or three. You can get together with a Catholic parish, or a Catholic neighbor and discuss each of the Ecumenical Imperatives together. (You can find "From Conflict to Communion" document here:

As part of the Edmonton service Archbishop Richard Smith, Bishop Jane Alexander and I signed a Lutheran-Anglican-Roman Catholic (LARC) agreement establishing a dialog between our three denominations. The first gathering of this group takes place the end of January.

We have now commemorated the 500th anniversary. But remember, it is the 500th anniversary of the beginning, not of the ending. And so, as we move into the next 500 years, we have the gift of the five Ecumenical Imperatives to guide us. The first one reminds us always to start with unity, not division. That's what we did through the Common Prayer Services, and that is our ongoing challenge as we journey forward together.
