



We have much to celebrate!

In 2013-14, as we formed new partnership amongst pastors, staff, council and congregation we started asking a series of questions: **Where is God leading? How can we form and build relationships with our neighbours? How can we be of service? What is our purpose?**

Those questions and others like them led to a variety of possibilities and new openings.

We participated with the Mission and Ministry initiative of the synod. Along the way discovered that open-ended experiments are challenging to us, both clergy and lay people alike. We really thrive better with clear structure and directives. That ultimately led to the LEAD initiative, a multi-year, multi-faceted process, clear process to help us answer the questions: Where is God leading us? How is God speaking through the Word? How is God speaking through our congregation? How is God speaking through our community? The exploration of these questions will help us gain clarity about our purpose in the world and direction for our ministry together. These are exciting times, as the Lead Listening Team has been trained and installed and begins to form the foundation for our exploration together!

We explored the possibility of making our physical space more available to the community. We are blessed with a lively, beautiful worship space that we use only for a few hours weekly.

- We subsequently leased our space to Southwood Church of God, who worship Sunday afternoon, hold monthly pot lunch lunches, and weekly Bible studies.
- We noted that the SW quadrant of Calgary has very few concert spaces and wondered together if we might become such a space. Our hope? To increase awareness and availability of the arts in our community. An amazingly quick fund-raising project coupled with an Alberta Community Initiatives Program (CIP) Grant

funded a concert-quality grand piano and seed funds to begin a concert series. (The Community Initiatives Program (CIP), Project-Based grant stream supports projects that enhance and enrich communities throughout Alberta by providing assistance to non-profit organizations for: new programs and initiatives, community events, and community publications.)

- As we began hosting evening events and increased the annual number of evening worship services, we discovered that our sanctuary lighting was rather poor. Who knew?! But unspent funds from our piano/concert initiative were sufficient for CIP to award us another grant, paying for concert quality lighting in our sanctuary, at no additional cost to the congregation!
- Although we were saddened in 2017

to lose our long-term tenant, Families of Alberta for Conductive Education (FACE) when they purchased their own property, the blessings of welcoming Cantaré Children's Choir onto our campus have been too numerous to count. The Staff relationships are stronger, our worship has been moved by the addition of Cantaré singers, Cantaré families are attending Sunday worship, and the general atmosphere of the Cantaré is one of resounding joy that keeps giving. Martin Luther once said, "One who sings, prays twice," and prayer is certainly in the air.

An initiative of a congregational member led to the restructuring of our children's education program. We know the result as BLAST: Bible Learning and Sharing Together. It's goal is to raise up biblically literate, faith and gospel centered people of all ages. BLAST engages people (not just children!) through storytelling, art, music, drama, and food to tell the story of Gods saving grace to people of all ages and abilities.



We planted a community garden. Garden tilling, planting and tending provides produce to the Dream Centre, Austin Nixon Manor and members of the church and encourages us all to bring and share the produce of our individual urban gardens.

We formed an outdoor group, encouraging activity and exploration of God's good creation in mountain, river, foothill, field, and even the church property.

With extended opportunities to worship during Advent, Epiphany, Holy Week, the Triduum (Three Holy Days of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Great Vigil of Easter), Reformation, and this year Ascension Thursday, we are taking seriously our call to tell and live the story.

We are renewing our challenging to be open, affirming, welcoming, inclusive, healing, and life-giving to people in marginalized communities. We began with a commitment to the LGBTQ+ community and have increased our awareness and desire to form and build relationships with indigenous peoples and Muslims. Look for a variety of conversations, activities, and opportunities to connect,

grow and build relationships as we expand our participation and awareness in the coming year.

As we move forward together, focus on the creativity, ingenuity, goodness, and community being built in this place. Live in gratitude for the abundant gifts we are receiving. Remember the fragility and imperfection of all of humanity and forgive the things that have hurt you along the way. Thank the staff, committed lay leaders and the many, many people who do a wide variety of things to make God's grace, love, and presence known through the work of Church of the Cross. Remember, the main purpose of a church is to make God's grace, love, and healing known to the world. We're doing so by building community and conversation. We have much to celebrate!

If you feel called to do something, but you don't know what, jot your name on the list by the mailboxes. We'll figure something out together...and we'll make sure it's something you care about and really, really want to do!

Ascension of Our Lord: Thursday Worship May 10 - 7pm


An often overlooked and under-celebrated feast day of the church year is Ascension Day, always a Thursday!

Jesus has been raised from the dead and has appeared in a variety of ways to convince people of God's power. On

Ascension Day, Jesus is taken to heaven, but not without promises and action plans for those who remain. Wait here! You will receive power to be witnesses throughout the whole earth. You will receive a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know God. You will receive an inheritance. You will know hope. You, the church, are Christ Jesus' body, even as his body disappears from sight.

It's like a holy game of tag in which Jesus tags followers, saying, "You're it. Now, you're me in the world." These are words we gather in worship to wait for, and we don't have long to wait. As we dip fingers in the font, we touch promises. We're a part of Christ's family. As we meet at the table, we taste promises. We become Christ's body.

And then in a few short days (on Pentecost), the Holy Spirit comes as promised, to call, bring together, inspire, and make holy.



These promises connected to Jesus' ascension result in the followers who worship, bless God, gain hopeful attitudes and a sense of mission as recorded in the book of Acts.

On the Day of the Ascension of Our Lord, two men in white robes urged those gazing up toward heaven to get going! We also need a similar prompt:

This living Jesus comes the same way as you saw him go. So watch for the presence of Christ, powerfully making the church his body. Watch for the presence of Christ, whenever the church pours itself out in love for others. As we come to know him and the hope to which he has called us, may we have open minds, enlightened hearts, and be clothed with power from on high.

Breaking the Ramadan Fast: Street Iftar May 17

For an entire month, Muslims around the world celebrate Ramadan, the ninth month in the Islamic calendar commemorating the first revelation to the prophet Mohammed in the Quran. During Ramadan Muslims observe strict fasting from sunrise to sunset, eating and drinking nothing at all during daylight hours and devoting themselves to prayer, study, and renewed acts of kindness and service. They often break each day's fast together, with neighbors or extended family in a large meal called "*iftar*," which begins after sunset at the call to evening prayer.



Ramadan is based on the lunar calendar, beginning on the sighting of the crescent moon and ending on the sighting of the next crescent moon, and moves 11 days earlier each year. This year Ramadan is May 15-June 14. The observance of Ramadan is one of the five pillars of Islam.



We have been invited to a "*street Iftar*," a large outdoor neighbourhood meal and celebration, on **May 17** at the home of **Mahmut and Selma Elbasi**, owners of Anatolia restaurant in the Arts Commons. You are also invited to participate in the Ramadan fast on that day, although fasting is a not requirement for your attendance at the Iftar. We are invited as guests.

If you would like to attend the Iftar, please sign up by the church mailboxes, so our hosts know how much food to prepare. The address, date and time of the Iftar will be printed there. Whether you attend or not, be sure to wish your Muslim friends a Holy and Blessed Ramadan.

Working for the Common Good



For the last couple of years, I have been involved with the **Calgary Alliance for the Common Good** (formerly called *Metro Alliance for the Common Good*). This is a com-

munity organizing alliance that is building relationships between faith communities, non-profits, labour unions and other community organizations for the sake of identifying pressures and challenges facing citizens... and identifying what we—together—might be able to do about it.

A couple of years ago after conducting a listening campaign amongst their membership, they identified two areas to focus on: senior citizen support and indigenous/non-indigenous reconciliation. Since then, they have formed a couple of research action teams to investigate and identify possible solutions that could make a difference in these areas.

Non-medical Support for Seniors to stay in their homes

When seniors are able to stay in their homes, they continue to be connected to, contribute to and supported by their established communities. One of the things that hinders this is that they are no longer able to do simple, manual tasks and are not able to find people to do this work for them. These can be as simple as snow shoveling, lawn care, changing light bulbs, hanging drapes, etc. MACG has identified this as an issue that they can do something about. They have begun meeting with the mayor and city councilors to work toward a city-supported initiative that will help give seniors access to these non-medical services by providing a central place to call identifying & vetting providers of these services. It could also include assisting such service-providing companies to get started.

Indigenous Gathering Place in Calgary

Most of the urban, indigenous population in Calgary are not members of the surrounding Blackfoot nations. In order to support this population spiritually and culturally, the Reconciliation Research Action Team identified the creation of an *indigenous gathering place* as a need for the indigenous community. It would also be a source of education and interaction between indigenous and non-indigenous people and, hence, a place to promote reconciliation. The Calgary Alliance for the Common Good is supporting this initiative to provide an Indigenous Gathering Place here in Calgary.




YOUR ONGOING SUPPORT - PRAYER, FINANCIAL, FRATERNAL AND SOLIDARITY - IS MUCH VALUED AND APPRECIATED, BY MYSELF AND BY MANY BENEFICIARIES. I AM GRATIFIED AND HONOURED TO BE ABLE TO CONTINUE REPRESENTING YOU IN THIS SACRED PLACE, AMONG THESE EXEMPLARY SISTERS AND BROTHERS IN RISEN CHRIST JESUS.

PRISON MINISTRY, AS YOU PROBABLY KNOW, HAS BEEN BLOCKED BY THE SALVADORAN GOVERNMENT OVER THE PAST 2.5 YEARS, ESPECIALLY DUE TO "TEMPORARY" "EXTRAORDINARY MEASURES" WHICH ISOLATE PRISON INMATES, ELIMINATING CONTACT WITH FAMILY, LAWYERS, THE RED CROSS, PASTORS AND BISHOPS, ETC. THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY IS BEING ENCOURAGED BY THE FMLN GOVERNMENT TO APPROVE AN EXTENSION FOR A THIRD YEAR. TUBERCULOSIS (3,400 CASES, OFFICIALLY, 17 DEATHS) AND EXTENSIVE MALNUTRITION ARE THE GRAVE RESULTS, THOUGH THE GOVERNMENT BLAMES THESE CRISES ON THE 400% OVERCROWDING, SO HAVING NOTHING TO DO WITH THE INHUMANE PUNITIVE MEASURES, DENOUNCED IN FEBRUARY BY THE UN RAPPORTEUR.

IN SPITE OF THESE RESTRICTIONS WHICH MAKE ME FEEL LIKE I AM IN EXILE FROM MY PRIMARY MINISTRY, THERE ARE MANY MEANINGFUL OPTIONS KEEPING ME FULLY OCCUPIED AND FULFILLED IN MINISTRY:

- OUR "FE Y ESPERANZA" HISTORICAL MEMORY ASSOCIATION, KEEPING OUR "FAMILY" FROM THE 80s TOGETHER AND CELEBRATING;
- "IPAZ" ECUMENICAL CHURCH LEADERS PROMOTING DIALOGUE AS A SOLUTION TO RAMPANT SOCIAL VIOLENCE;
- SECRETARY OF THE "CRISPAZ" BOARD;
- ACCOMPANYING THE ROSALES PUBLIC HOSPITAL HIV MUTUAL SUPPORT GROUP;
- ACCOMPANYING A DIVERSITY OF EDUCATIONAL AND SOLIDARITY DELEGATIONS;
- ELECTION OBSERVATION AND TEAM COORDINATION;
- HOSTING A HOUSEFUL OF DISPLACED PERSONS, SEVERAL OF WHOM HAVE BECOME PERMANENT RESIDENTS;
- ACCOMPANYING THE SALVADORAN LUTHERAN CHURCH IN A RICH VARIETY OF WORSHIP, EDUCATIONAL AND SOCIAL MINISTRY ACTIVITIES.

SINCE OUR ABT SYNOD'S ARRANGEMENT WITH CANADA REVENUE AGENCY FOR THIS "IN MISSION WITH EL SALVADOR" MINISTRY ALLOWS ONLY FOR PRISON AND HIV/AIDS MINISTRY EXPENSES, I WAS GRANTED AN INCREASE IN MY MONTHLY STIPEND FOR 2018 TO COVER SOME OF THESE DIVERSE MINISTRY EXPENSES. UNFORTUNATELY, AN INCREASE IN HOME RENT EATS UP MUCH OF THAT. AT ANY RATE, IT IS ILLEGAL TO HELP OR SUPPORT THE PRIMARY GROUPS WE HAD BEEN WORKING WITH FOR TWO DECADES, AS MANY ARE NOW OFFICIALLY "TERRORISTS," AND ANY CONTACT IS CONDEMNED AS ILLEGAL ASSOCIATION, EVEN FOR PASTORS AND BISHOPS.

OTHER OPPORTUNITIES AND NEEDS PRESENT THEMSELVES DAILY, AND, CONSIDERING THEIR URGENCY—EVEN LIFE AND DEATH—IT IS IMPOSSIBLE TO DENY REQUESTS FOR ACCOMPANIMENT AND FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE. THE RECIPIENTS ARE MOST APPRECIATIVE, AND THE GIVERS—YOU INCLUDED, I TRUST—ENRICHED.

MAY WE CONTINUE TO BE INSTRUMENTS OF THE COMING OF GOD'S REIGN IN 2018, THROUGH OUR PRAYERS AND ACTIONS.



God Moments

I spent two weeks in April at Lutheran Theological Seminary in Saskatoon taking a course on Indigenous Intercultural Relations. The course covered topics including colonialism

and Indian residential schools; the Indigenous understanding of relationships between humans, land and the Creator; and treaties. We kicked off the course by participating in the Kairos Blanket Exercise on Monday evening.

The Kairos Blanket Exercise is an experiential lesson about the history of Indigenous people and colonialism in Canada. At the beginning of the exercise blankets were laid out on the floor representing the land that is now known

as Canada. The participants walk across the blankets, representing the many First Nations who lived in Canada prior to contact with Europeans. There is a facilitator who narrates the history of the colonization of Canada. As time goes on participants are asked to leave the blankets and sit down as Indigenous people die from things like disease and starvation. At the same time the size and number of blankets shrinks as land

is taken from First Nations through treaties or otherwise. Some of us remained standing but off of the blankets to represent Indigenous people who are disconnected from their communities and culture.

I was one of those who was asked to stand off of the blanket. Up to that point I had been approaching the exercise as a game: if I stayed standing on the blanket I won. That quickly changed. As the narrator described the Sixties Scoop – the name given to the period from the 1960s to the 1980s in which thousands of Indigenous children were removed from their families and adopted by non-Indigenous families – and pointed to me, a voice in my

head boomed, “You’re Garry. You’re Garry. You’re Garry.” How could the narrator know about Garry?

Garry was a Cree child adopted by my Father and his first wife in the early 1970s. The adoption had dissolved and the family was no longer in touch with Garry by the time my parents met. I have never met Garry and do not know most of story. He has recently reached out to my father and older siblings. How did the narrator know about Garry? The narrator did not, but I am sure that the Holy Spirit did and was speaking to me through the Blanket Exercise and the narrator.

Garry was on my mind as I began that course. I was aware that my own family had, with the best of intentions, participated in the destruction of Indigenous culture, what the Truth and Reconciliation Commission identifies as cultural genocide. Garry was one of those First Nations children who never re-established ties with his Cree roots

and culture. Embarking on this learning journey, I wanted to know what my role is in reconciliation with Indigenous people is. The Holy Spirit was reminding me that I do have a role, not only as a person of faith, but also as a settler and descendant of a family who had been part of the Sixties Scoop. My role is in creating and sustaining healthy relationships with Indigenous people,

including this Indigenous brother who I have never met, yet.

The Holy Spirit opens our eyes to injustice, past and present, and points fingers at us, and lights a Pentecost fire under us to love and to restore right relationships with all our neighbours. I have a role in reconciliation with Indigenous people in Canada, as do all people of faith.

Listening Team News

A while back I was wondering if my Mom had a hearing problem. So one Thursday evening when we all got together for groceries and dinner, I stood behind her while she was sitting at the kitchen table. I softly said, "Mom, can you hear me?" No response. So I came a little closer and said again, "Mom, can you hear me?" Still, no response. So I moved right behind her and said, "Mom, can you hear me?" She replied, "**For the third time, Yes!**"

Mom's hearing is stellar, mine needs work. So I'm glad to be part of the Church of the Cross Listening Team and we're deep into our training to learn how to become better at Listening to God, Listening to God in our Congregation and Listening to God in our Neighborhood. The Listening Team is part of our congregational LEAD initiative: Live Every Day as Disciples.

Our Listening Team is still studying and building our skills, right now we're studying the Book of Acts and learning from the examples of the Disciples as they bravely took the message of the Son of God out to the world. 
