



Standing for What?

I was born in 1960 and that, literally, makes me... a child of the 60's. As such, I grew up while American society was having a very significant and often tumultuous "conversation" about institutions. In the context of Watergate and the Vietnam War, a great deal of suspicion and criticism of institutions arose. This became part of a wave of *anti-institutionalism* in which it seemed like every organized aspect of our society was suddenly suspect and viewed with scrutiny. In many respects, we are still living in the aftermath of this anti-institutionalism.

Because of this experience, the word *institution* (in my mind) was associated with words like: *bureaucracy, corrupt, stale, insensitive, old-fashioned, behind the times...* Not a very positive list!

Since the sixties, most of society's institutions have been suffering or even been dismantled:

- Church membership is declining,
- Lodges and other fraternal organizations are disappearing,
- Schools and seminaries are often struggling to stay open.

This summer, I attended a community organizing training in Chicago. In this training, they talked about their commitment to building up and supporting the institutions in our society. In my mind, I was saying, *Why? They are just bureaucratic, corrupt, stale, insensitive...* you get the picture.

They continued to explain that *institutions of society are the vessels by which values and culture are passed on from generation to generation.*

Ohhhhhhh...

This made me very curious about what the word *institution* actually means. When I looked into the etymology of *institution*, the root of the word is the same

as *statue*. It means to *set up* or *stand*. Therefore, words with this same root make sense:

- *constitute* means to together set up or together stand for;
- *destitute* means to be out of standing or have no standing;
- *prostitute* means to stand before.


I was able to attend the community organizing training through our association with the Metro Alliance for the Common Good (MACG). One of their commitments is to strengthen its member institutions: churches, synagogues, mosques, neighborhood associations, unions, social service organizations, etc. In light of the dismantling of institutions which has been happening since the sixties, this kind of building up and strengthening is necessary.

In light of the *dismantling* of institutions which has been happening over the last couple of decades, it raises the question, *What are the values we stand for as a congregation and how are we going to pass them on?*

Over the next few months, I (and others) will intentionally be engaging in conversations with you about what it is that *we stand for*.

- What are our core values?
- What do we want to leave behind for the next generation?
- How can we partner with—and even take leadership—in strengthening other institutions which contribute to a healthy society?

The Narthex: A place of hope, healing, and welcome

In the 1600’s, the word “narthex” came into common usage. It was used to describe the outdoor porch often found at the west end of early churches. The word came into the English language directly from the Greek, where it was the name of the giant fennel plant, whose stem structure was hollow. The thought was, the narthex of the church was a gathering place leading into something substantive, namely the sanctuary.

Our narthex, the place between the outer doors of the building and the doors of the sanctuary is our “porch”. It is a gathering place, a place to hang out, a place to chat and catch up. Our narthex is the main place where relationships begin and are nurtured.

Every member of Church of the Cross is called upon to minister in this space, in the same ways you would on the front porch of your house. Say hello to people who pass by. Offer coffee to those who linger longer.

Look for those who are new to the neighborhood. Remember what it was like for you when you were new to this place. Make the first move. Welcome them. Introduce them to your friends.

Talk about this community, why you are here, and about your hopes and dreams for the church.

Communities used to be built upon the conversations and friendships begun on the front porch. In churches they still are! Hang around after worship and be kind to everyone you meet.

Invitation: An Act of Compassion

What are you inviting people to experience when you invite them to church? Are you inviting them to worship? Are you inviting them to meet your friends? Are you inviting them to hear good music, or listen to your pastor? Why do you invite (or not)?

Consider that your invitations are not about you. Consider that you don't have anything to share; you don't have anything to offer; and you don't have anything to lose. Consider that inviting isn't about you at all.

Bringing people to church is about THEM. Inviting people is about hearing something inside of someone else that aches. Maybe the ache is an unresolved pain. Maybe the ache is loneliness. Or abandonment. Or distance. Maybe it is the absence of connection. Maybe you don't know what it is at all.

But your invitations matter. People yearn for connection with God, creation, and other people. These connections are soothing, affirming, and life giving. These kinds of connections comfort us and inspire us; offer us hope and heal us; are they are surprising. Today's world offers few opportunities for these kinds of connections. The church offers them all the time.

Consider that maybe your invitations are a form of compassion for your neighbors and friends. Consider that maybe your invitations are like life savers tossed to shipwreck victims. It's just that the people you are tossing them to don't look like they're drowning.

Things you can do:

- Have conversations with the people in your life about faith. What is their faith? Did they grow up in the church? Are they worshipping somewhere now? If not, what happened? Have your conversations lead to connection and invitation.
- Remember, your invitations are an act of compassion. You aren't trying to get people to do something, but offering relief. If someone were dying of thirst, would you tell them where to find water? Church of the Cross offers all kinds of "water" for people who are "thirsty": worship, prayer, financial relief, study, companionship, entertainment, conversation, life coaching, friendship, compassion.... Make a point of offering these things to others who need them.


September Book of the Month

The Treasure Principle

Unlocking the Secret of Joyful Giving

by Randy Alcorn

"When you discover the secret joy of the Treasure Principle, I guarantee you'll never be content with less." So claims Randy Alcorn in the introduction to this small gift book on Christian generosity. Noting that fifteen percent of Jesus' teachings in the New Testament deal with money



and possessions (more than his teachings on eternal life), Alcorn compares heavenly treasure, which is eternal, with earthly riches, which "will always be lost".

Alcorn encourages Christians to understand that everything they believe they own is actually God's; they are merely managers. He is a compelling storyteller, whether drawing on Scrip-

ture, accounts of others who have lived generously, or recounting his own experiences.

Analyzing the pervasive disease of "affluenza" and the fact that North Americans' unprecedented wealth does not seem to be bringing extraordinary happiness, he says that he and other people who have discovered the secret of unfettered giving know that they are storing up treasures in heaven, their true home.

Many Christians will appreciate his countercultural messages that "giving is the only antidote to materialism" and the "*health and wealth gospel* dishonors Christ." Indeed, for many, this could be a life-changing book.


Passing on the Faith to our Children!

Faith Formation Opportunities



This study resumes from the late spring, but all are welcome to join the conversation. Newcomers to the conversation will be given background information and brought “up to speed.” We encourage your participation and look forward to welcoming you!

As a continuation of the gospel of Luke, The Acts of the Apostles tells the story of the growth of the early church from the original disciples huddled together in Jerusalem, to Asia minor and all the way to Rome. It is a particularly helpful book to study as we seek to discover and recover the essence of being the Church.

We resume our study with Acts of the Apostles, Chapter 8.

How does it work? Group participants volunteer to read from the biblical text. Lively group conversation, studied by pastoral comment, background information, and current events brings scripture and faith into sharp, relevant life context. This study has a “soft start”; it begins with casual conversation amongst friends old and new, coffee, song, and prayer. Great conversation usually carries us beyond 11:30, even though that is our designated end time. People stay or leave as they wish. *Note: We try to end on time!*


How does it work? Then a conversation follows about the text, our lives, faith, the church and the world. Questions that surface are researched, then addressed the following week. Tea is normally served & sometimes accompanied by a light snack. ***This course encourages participation with Cursillo, which begins with a 3-day weekend experience in either the fall or the spring.***

Everything has a starting point—your life, your relationships, your education, your career.

Sometimes we forget that faith has a starting point as well. For some of us, our faith journeys began in childhood as a set of beliefs handed to us by a parent, teacher, or pastor. Too often, a faith formed in childhood isn't strong enough to withstand the pressures of adult life.

But what if you could find a new starting point for faith?

Welcome to Starting Point – an 8-session small group conversation about faith. Whether you're new to faith, curious about God, or coming back to church after some time away, it's a place where your opinions and beliefs are valued, and no question is off limits. During the eight sessions, you will:

CONFIRMATION



Students in grades 7 and 8 are invited to explore matters of faith en route to affirming their baptism. (Students in grades 8 & 9 may participate upon consultation with the pastors.) *Confirmation is a rite of passage in which young people assume responsibility for their own lives of faith. Confirmed youth are considered full members of the congregation, given voice and vote in congregational matters and able to hold positions on official congregational committees.*

So much more than a means to gaining voice and vote in the congregation, the Confirmation process is a time to learn and practice critical thinking in matters of faith and life. Here young people gain a vital faith foundation that can serve them their entire lives.

Questions and exploration undergird this two-year adventure, as we explore the Apostles' Creed, the 10 commandments, the Lord's Prayer, the sacraments of the church, the Bible, and Luther's life and contribution to the church and world.

If you have never been confirmed and are older than grade 9, you are encouraged to participate in Starting Point.

How does it work? We meet weekly to discuss faith and life matters, take on special projects, and attend a weekend program at Camp Kuriakos in the early spring. Young people are partnered with a mentor (an adult member of the congregation who serves as a role model, guide, and friend in the Christian faith) throughout the process and confirmed on Reformation Sunday following two years of program participation.

Cursillo

("Cursillo" is Spanish for "little course")

Approximately three dozen men or women meet from Thursday evening until Sunday evening with a team of two-four ordained ministers and fifteen to thirty laypeople. Fifteen talks are given, ten by laypersons and five by the clergy. The talks lead to lively discussions in small groups.

The three days are interspersed with music, sharing, laughter, prayer, reflection and silence as you discover what it means to say, "We are the body of Christ."

Holy Communion is celebrated each day (except Thursday) as well as morning and evening prayers. There is nothing dull about a Cursillo weekend. It is a joyous workshop in the fundamentals of beautiful, lively faith where everyone learns by experiencing a living community.

Is Cursillo for me?

Cursillo is for you, if:

- You feel called to a deeper commitment to your faith.
- You want to more fully understand the mission you are called to through your baptism.
- You are looking for a way to sustain your Christian journey.
- You attend Church regularly (or want to)



Old Testament

Amy-Jill Levine's commentary on the Old Testament thoughtfully explores selected passages from the texts called the Old Testament, the Hebrew Bible, and the Tanakh. Dr. Amy-Jill Levine is University Professor of New Testament and Jewish Studies, E. Rhodes and Leona B. Carpenter Professor of New Testament Studies, and Professor of Jewish Studies at Vanderbilt University Divinity School and the College of Arts and Sciences. She is also Affiliated Professor at the Woolf Institute, Centre for the Study of Jewish-Christian Relations, at Cambridge University in the United Kingdom. Dr. Levine earned her B.A. with high honors in English and Religion at Smith College, where she graduated magna cum laude. She went on to earn her M.A. and Ph.D. in Religion from Duke University. Professor Levine's numerous books, articles, and essays address such topics as Second-Temple Judaism, Christian origins, Jewish-Christian relations, and biblical women. She has served on the editorial boards of the Journal of Biblical Literature and the Catholic Biblical Quarterly and has held office in the Society of Biblical Literature, the Catholic Biblical Association, and the Association for Jewish Studies. A widely sought-after speaker and favorite at the Chautauqua Institution, she has given hundreds of talks on biblical topics to both academic and nonacademic audiences, including church, synagogue, and community groups throughout the United States, Canada, and the United Kingdom. Her awards include grants from the Mellon Foundation, the National Endowment for the Humanities, and the American Council of Learned Societies.



The Rag Doll Prayer Project

At CLAY 2016 each of our youth got to sign up for two ministry projects. These were sessions that were meant to give them a more in depth look at a variety of topics including yoga, liturgical dance, improvisation, singing, drumming, spoken word, photography, indigenous and non-indigenous relationships, ecological justice, hunger, life on the streets, prayer, radical welcoming, and true gift-giving. The first ministry project that my sister Mikaela and I signed up for was entitled *"Stop Traffick"* and focused on the many types of human trafficking and the effects they have on their victims. We watched a film entitled *"Not my Life"* by Robert Bilheimer that was compiled of interviews with survivors of the sex trade, domestic slavery and child labour and soldiery. In this film, we learned about the fishing boys of Lake Volta, who work 14 hour days, sustained only by one small meal. Many of these boys die because of entanglement in the underwater fish nets. We listened to Grace as she told how she was forced to kill as a child soldier, and we learned that sometimes the first people these children are forced to kill are their parents, their siblings, and their relatives; those they hold closest to them. Sometimes, they even turned the gun on themselves when it just becomes too hard. We saw the lines of shacks where young girls were housed, dreaded being hand-picked by men that would have them delivered to their hotel rooms for anywhere from a few hours to a month. We heard the voice of a young woman who, at seven, was told that if she did not comply and give her body to her attacker, she would be electrocuted, forced to eat hot peppers, and be stung by poisonous insects. Another woman named Angie lived

just across our border, in the United States. At fifteen, she ran away from her home with two other girls, one of which knew a guy who could come and get them. That evening, Angie and the other girls became victims of the sex trade and were told that they had better come back with money, or they would be killed. She saw pictures of her sex partner's grandchildren, and could only think, "He could have been my grandpa." She then tells us that at that moment, she just wanted to die. We also heard the other side of these stories, the voice of an attacker. He started when he was 14; he was just fooling around. He describes not feeding his victims, and beating them with his fists, and with his feet. And the whole time he tells us this, he is smiling.



Every one of these stories is woven into the gruesome tapestry of human trafficking, and every one of them gave us a better understanding of what was happening in our world today. Together, we discussed what stuck out the most in the video for us. We listened to each other's thoughts and reflected on the horror of what we had heard and seen, and then we turned towards the One who hears all, and we prayed about it. But one prayer would never be enough, and

that's where the rag dolls come in. These dolls were stuffed and clothed by youth from all over Canada as a reminder to pray for human trafficking victims. They are faceless because they have lost their identity to this unimaginable plight. One of these dolls can be found at our church, and all we ask is that you take a moment to stop whatever you are doing, and pray for all the men, woman, and children who are affected by human trafficking daily. Think of Angie, and Grace, and all the others. Remember the survivors, and the ones that didn't make it. And remember the traffickers, because they need just as much help as the victims do.

SINGING OUR LIVES – PART 2

At this past summer’s National Anglican-Lutheran Worship Conference, Formation & Reformation: Worship, Justice, and God’s Mission, presenter The Rev. Dr. Stephen Larson posed several questions as he began his first keynote address.

These questions stirred up my memory and caused me to reflect. Questions like: *What is the first childhood prayer that you remember? What was your earliest awareness of the liturgy? When did you memorize hymns? Who are your musical mentors? Your liturgical mentors? What is the most meaningful season or day of the church year for you? What are your favorite hymn, carols, songs?*

This last one sent me on a deep trip down memory lane. There are so many I thought. In fact, I have a list of favorites. *“Children of the Heavenly Father”* sung at every family funeral that I can remember. *“Joy to the World”* proclaimed on the Eve of Christmas. *“Beautiful Saviour”* sung without accompaniment and in four-part harmony...or more. The beauty and simplicity of *“Jesus, Remember Me.”* *“Holy, Holy Holy”* sung in Spanish and with friends from Colombia or El Salvador. Oh, the list goes on!

Over the course of my lifetime these texts and melodies have shaped my faith. I’ve sung them “by heart,” in the heart, and from the heart. Through the practice of singing, the dispositions and beliefs expressed in the words of the hymns – gratitude, praise, trust, lament, joy, hope – have been knit into my body, as integral parts of the theology by which I live.

These hymns and songs are carried – profoundly – deeply – within my bones.

This formation of an embodied theology happens whenever congregations sing, even though they do so in a great variety of ways from one culture to another – from one congregation to another.



Read and Reflect: Colossians 3:16

Discuss and Reflect:

- What in this reading leads you to say, “I wonder about...”, or, “I noticed...”
- Consider sharing (and singing) a song from childhood that is part of your faith tradition.
- What is the most powerful memory the song evokes? What does it say about the faith of your childhood? Are there connections to the faith of your adulthood?
- Reflect on the various ways in which music is sung in worship.
- Comment on the following: *“Over the course of my lifetime these texts and melodies have shaped my faith.”*

Pray together: Maker of creation's choir, you sing the Song of Love to us. Breathe your Spirit into our singing until the rhythm of your mercy shapes all our music-making and we join with one another to give you thanks and praise. Amen. (Susan Briehl)

The God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit (Romans 15:13).




Will you be able to donate to the Refugee Mission fund?


