



What is that thing on the floor?

*History
Journeys in the Bible
Listening to God*

You may have noticed that there is a lot of masking tape on the floor of the Fellowship Hall. At a casual glance, it looks like a maze. It is actually a labyrinth.

Back in the Spring (or whatever season it is before it stops snowing more or less), I was studying prayer with the Confirmation Class. We began with the Lord’s Prayer but I also introduced them to meditation/contemplative prayer, *Praying in Color*, and a *prayer labyrinth*. I initially set up a *pew labyrinth* in the sanctuary but ran into a snag when the sanctuary was not available for our Mentor Night! I made the one with masking tape with the intention of taking it up after we were done with the Prayer Module.

The purpose of a Prayer Labyrinth is to create a space for a sacred journey. They began in Europe as a way for people to simulate a pilgrimage to Rome when that was not possible due to conflicts or finances. One of the oldest and most well-known labyrinths is on the floor of the sanctuary of the Cathedral in Chartres, France. For over a thousand years, Christians have made the journey to Chartres to make the sacred journey in that labyrinth.

The Bible is full of journeys: Abraham’s journey from Haran to the Canaan, the Israelites journey in the wilderness for forty years to the promised land, Jesus’ journey from Galilee to Jerusalem, and Paul’s journeys around the Mediterranean. The journey in the wilderness of the Israelites is a good one to illumine the sacred journey that a labyrinth can provide...

The journey in the wilderness began with the deliverance from the oppression of the Egyptians. It began with them fleeing from a present that was painful, hard, and did not

offer much of a future. They headed out into the Sinai wilderness with a hope and a promise of a *promised land*. As they wandered, they began shedding, naming, and letting go of their life in Egypt and as slaves. In the wilderness, they had a primary encounter with God at Mt. Sinai in which God made a covenant with them and provided them with the Ten Commandments as a sign and component of that covenant. They spent the rest of the time in the wilderness then learning to incorporate this relationship and way of life into their everyday lives.

This is the dynamic of the labyrinth. On the *journey in*, it is a time of naming and offering up to God the present concerns and pressures. Upon reaching the center, it is a time to pause and allow God to present in the “emptiness” that has



been created by clearing out all of the clutter and distractions that tend to fill our lives. After having this time with God in the center, the *journey out* is a processing of what was experienced in the center. Was there an answer to a prayer or concern that came to you? How does this impact or illumine your life now?

About the time I was getting ready to pull up the masking tape labyrinth, we began having our first Listening Team meetings. The Listening Team is tasked to listen to God through prayer and Scripture, to listen to God through the congregation, and to listen to God through the neighbourhood. It made sense to introduce this prayer tool to the Listening Team. As we spent time contemplating our task for the next several months, it became clear that the labyrinth could be a symbol of the work that we are doing as a congregation during this *Tune In* process... We seek and create opportunities to listen. We listen. Then we ponder what we heard.

If you haven’t taken a moment to walk the labyrinth, I hope that you would!

Update from Administrators



It seems that spring/summer is in full swing and we want to send out a mid-year update.

It's good to be past the winter thaw and the roof leaks we were experiencing. We still don't have a solution going forward but are looking at doing some tar patching. We will also have to do some repair to some drywall inside that was damaged. We will still have to monitor during any upcoming heavy rainfall.

As many of you have likely noticed, the theatre lighting is complete. We have 4 PAR lights directly over the dais, to illuminate the altar area. There are two more PAR lights positioned on the choir. There are 2 fixed spots to light the front of the altar area, and two movable spots to cover various areas as needed.

The control for the house lights has been integrated into the lighting console, so those lights are now controllable from the sound booth.

The sconce lighting on the north and south walls has been replaced. The old fixtures drew 400 Watts each and have been replaced by 20 Watt LEDs for a saving of 2280 Watts. These lights are still controlled by the same 2 switches by the south door. We also replaced the ceiling fan in the south west corner.

There is a 10 switch box in place that will be configured with fixed lighting options to simplify use of the lighting, Position 1 is configured for just the house lights, while 6 is used to turn them all off.

Our agreement with Cantaré included some outside storage space. We've agreed upon an 8'x 20' C can container. Cantaré will absorb the cost of the container, permit, installation and painting. This will be placed on the east side between the dumpster and our storage shed. It will also be painted to blend in with the color of the shed and dumpster enclosure.

We want to extend our thanks to the numerous garden volunteers who have been very busy brightening up our grounds. Thanks as well to the quilting group who did some kitchen clean-up and also defrosted and cleaned the freezer and cleaned the cooler in the storage room.





Beyoncé and Mustard

A couple of Sundays ago, Pastor Laura preached a great sermon, “How big is a Mustard Seed” on Jesus’ Parable of that tiny seed that can grow into a towering bush big enough to shelter birds and drive farmers insane when they’re trying to keep it out of their fields. I’m not going to go into details on the sermon. If you missed it, check it out here: <https://www.churchofthecross.ca/media/2018-06-17-how-big-is-a-mustard-seed>.

Pastor Laura does mention that Jesus had a special gift for connecting with his audience with simple stories to illustrate his greater point and teachings. He used stories that his audience could readily identify with; stories about mustard seeds and lamp oil and weddings and illness and healing and rich men and poor widows. Everyday stuff that was presented in a context meaningful to his audience to illustrate his point about the Kingdom of God and how to behave and act to achieve a meaningful relationship with the Father, Son and Holy Ghost.

This got me to thinking about how I can readily identify with the Parable of the Mustard Seed as I’ve pulled enough of it out of the bean fields on my Grandpa Ed’s farm in Minnesota. I’ve seen it growing in ditches all the way from Saskatchewan through North Dakota down into Iowa. I even have fond memories of doing such intense battle with one particularly stubborn mustard plant out in a soybean field in the hot humid Minnesotan heat that when I finally wrestled the giant out of the earth I tumbled flat on my back with showers of rich Minnesota dirt descending on my sweaty face and white t-shirt while the gales of Aunt Dorothy’s laughter serenaded my bruised ego. I get Jesus’ parable about Mustard partly because I was part of a farming family and partly because, well, I’m part of an older generation.

But how many kids today connect with mustard other than out of a French’s yellow squeeze bottle to slather yellow stuff on their hotdog? What sense does the para-

ble mean to them?

Delivering Christ’s message to a contemporary audience is one of the challenges our Listening Team will be focused on in the coming months. The Listening Team is deeply engaged in studying Acts to get a better understanding on how the Disciples and Apostles brought Christianity to the world some 2000 years ago. But we also recognize that simply replicating what was done then, may not work now. Just as we recognize that the approaches to serving the community that we’ve used in the past (since 1961!) may not be the most effective now.



5,000 people attended a sermon delivered by the Reverend Martin Luther King in 1964.

Yet, Grace Cathedral suffers from the same dwindling membership that Lutheran Church of the Cross is experiencing. The congregation consists of lots of faithful seniors but as the age lowers, so does membership representation and participation. We share this situation with a lot of congregations around the world.

One of the ways Grace Cathedral decided to bring in a new audience was to host a special mass: the “Beyoncé Mass”. For those of you who don’t know, Beyoncé is a major music superstar with over one hundred million albums sold and winner of twenty-eight Grammy awards. I, personally, couldn’t tell you one of Beyoncé’s hits but I do know that she’s a regular headliner on Entertainment Television which I quickly switch over to either the news or the Murdoch Mysteries (which tells you I’m pretty close to being one of the elder Seniors in our Church).

The idea for this mass sprang from the Rev. Yolanda Norton, a San Francisco Theological Seminary professor whose specialty is the Old Testament. She developed a series of programs at Grace Cathedral called “Speaking Truth: The Power of Story in Community”, which aims to tell stories of those traditionally marginalized in Christianity, such as women and people of color.

So they decided to host this special “*Beyoncé Mass*” on a week day evening and they posted an invitation on their Facebook page and in the bulletin. On the evening of the event, after the final warm-up rehearsal, they looked out the doors and saw to their amazement that the lineup went well around the block (BIG blocks in San Francisco). Over 900 people attended that event for a joyous celebration of God’s message blended with Beyoncé’s music; an incredible and unexpected success.

To quote Professor Norton, “*I don’t know that Beyoncé necessarily intersects with religion, but religion intersects*

with everyone, every experience, every hardship and every trial. Her lyrics speak to that all the time, just as Christ’s message does”.

Grace Cathedral found a way to make Christ’s message resonate with their community.

I don’t think a Beyoncé Service would have the same level of success in Calgary, Alberta.

But I will tell you that the Listening Team is going to be listening to our community to find out what needs exist outside the four walls of our church and we must be ready, able and willing to send forth God’s message in a context that our audience needs.



DID YOU KNOW??

Homosexuality is no longer as widely criminalized as it used to be. However 74 nations still have laws against it. In some cases, such as Egypt, there is a vague but harshly enforced law against "debauchery". Other countries have laws against "unnatural acts". Chechnya has recently had a brutal campaign against gay and bisexual men.

The 74 countries with anti-sexuality laws are in Africa, Asia, the Middle East, Americas (such as Barbados, Jamaica, and St. Lucia) and Oceania. In the United States, anti-Sodomy laws were ruled unconstitutional by the Supreme Court in 2003. Having said that, there are still 13 States that have that law on their Books.





An Invisible Thread: The True Story of an 11-Year-Old Panhandler, a Busy Sales Executive, and an Unlikely Meeting with Destiny

An Invisible Thread tells of the life-long friendship between a busy sales executive and a disadvantaged young boy, and how both of their lives were changed by what began as one small gesture of kindness.

When Laura Schroff brushed by a young panhandler on a New York City corner one rainy afternoon, something made her stop and turn back. She took the boy to lunch at the McDonald's across the street that day. And she continued to go back, again and again for the next four years until both their lives had changed dramatically. Nearly thirty years later, that young boy, Maurice, is married and has his own family. Now he works to change the lives of disadvantaged kids, just like the boy he used to be.

It is the heartwarming story of a friendship that has spanned three decades and brought meaning to an over-scheduled professional and hope to a hungry and desperate boy living on the streets.


From the #1 New York Times bestselling authors of An Invisible Thread comes a heartwarming book about the huge impact that small acts of kindness from strangers can have on the world around us.




