#### **Building Community - Opportunities to Serve**

We live in a society which tends to be very transactional. If someone wants or needs something, then one simply pays for it and receives it. We pay for food, housing, utilities, meals, cars, clothes, TV's, golf clubs (and tee times), concerts, music... the list goes on and on.

In one's own family, one can see, however, that a *transactional way of living* only goes so far. Something more is needed than food, lodging, transportation and clothes. Some of it is tangible and practical:

- Meals need to be prepared;
- Trash taken out;
- Dishes & laundry need to be washed;
- Pets need to be tended to.
- There are also less "tangible" things that need to be done:
  - Schedules made and communicated;
  - Listening and talking;
  - Spending time together;
  - Playing games;
  - Emotionally supporting one another.

The same goes for a congregation: a transactional way of living only goes so far...

On Friday, August 9<sup>th</sup>, your Church Council gathered to discern the particular values and goals we will focus on for the next several months. We began this time of discernment with this part of the letter that Paul wrote to the church in Philippi [Philippians 2:1-8]:

If then there is any encouragement in Christ, any consolation from love, any sharing in the Spirit, any compassion and sympathy, <sup>2</sup> make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. <sup>3</sup> Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. <sup>4</sup> Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others.

<sup>5</sup>Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus,<sup>6</sup> who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, <sup>7</sup> but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, <sup>8</sup> he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death even death on a cross.

To live a Christian life is to live a life of service. I give thanks for all those who have chosen to serve Christ and the congregation by being on Council. I also give thanks for all those who usher, teach, prepare & serve communion, count money, clean, make sandwiches, quilt, manage the property, visit, lead groups, tell stories, assist with BLAST, sing in the choir, read the lessons, acolyte, manage the sound & powerpoint... and the list goes on.

As we begin another school year and year of programming, I invite you to find your place in the congregation to serve. It may be something you enjoy doing. It may be something you've already tried. It may be something that challenges and scares you that you want to overcome (that's what reading lessons in worship represented for me when I began). Whatever calls to you, I invite you to find your place of service and invest yourself in the health of our congregation. By doing so, you will be embodying the life of the servant that Christ calls us to. Along the way, you'll also find that one of the best ways to develop friendships is by working together on a common purpose and goal.

#### Foundation of Respect -By Richard Rohr

The following is the daily devotion for Sunday, August 4, 2019 from the Center for Action and Contemplation . It is part of that week's theme, "Interspiritual Mysticism." It seems particularly applicable as we seek to live in this increasingly diverse society. cac.org/category/daily-meditations/

At their most mature levels, religions have a common goal: union with all beings and with God. Unfortunately, many religions and Christian denominations have overemphasized differences and claimed that their particular brand is superior to others. Jesus didn't come to start another religion but to reveal God's presence in all of us. The Christian name for the universal incarnation is Christ, but it is known by innumerable other names.

Leaders of the Catholic Church have acknowledged the perennial and pervasive nature of truth. For example, the Second Vatican Council teaches that all peoples comprise a single community and share the same origin, "for God made the whole human race to live over the face of the earth. One also is their final goal: God." [1] The declaration goes on to praise indigenous religions, Hinduism, and Buddhism as they "reflect a ray of that Truth which enlightens all [people]," and states "the Catholic Church rejects nothing that is true and holy in these religions." [2]

Continuing our exploration of mystics, I want to share some insights from several Christians who have found deep wisdom in other faiths that affirms truth in Christian texts and tradition. Today's meditation is a bit longer than usual to lay some ground work.

Dr. Beatrice Bruteau (1930–2014) was a pioneer in integrating science, mathematics, philosophy, and religions, especially Hinduism and Christianity. While she may not be a household name, her ideas have deeply influenced CAC faculty member Cynthia Bourgeault. Though Bruteau lived what some might consider a quiet life, her mind was busy expanding the world's ideas of consciousness and evolution. She believed that mysticism was foundational to transforming the world. I offer you this very clear and compelling passage from Bruteau:

A "better" world is one in which we recognize that all people possess an incomparable value that we are morally obliged to respect . . . in social, political, and economic terms. Honoring the humanity of your fellow beings means that if they are hungry, ill, or oppressed, you must exert yourself to help them. . . . But this . . . runs up against our inherited instincts of self-protection, greediness, and desire to dominate others. . . . If we could rearrange energy from within—if we more often nurtured our

companions and promoted their well-being, we would suffer much less. Rearranging energy from within is what mysticism does.

How does mysticism do this? Consider that domination, greed, cruelty, violence, and all our other ills arise from a sense of insufficient and insecure being. I need more power, more possessions, more respect and admiration. But it's never enough; the fear always remains. It comes from every side: from other people; from economic circumstances; from ideas, customs, and belief systems; from the natural environment; from our own bodies and minds. All these others intimidate us, threaten us, make us anxious. We can't control them. They are, to varying degrees, aliens. Our experience is: where I am "I," they are "not-I."

At least this is our experience insofar as we are not mystics. But, fortunately, everyone is a mystic. At some deep level, we know that we are not mutually alienated from each other and that we do have sufficient being.... The practice of raising this knowledge is the process of becoming a mystic in experience as well as in potentiality....

There are exercises for cultivating this transition in every culture and tradition. We can learn from any or all of them....

In talking with one another, sharing experiences, teaching and encouraging one another . . . we are helping each other know that we are deeply related, that we are all precious and deserving, that the universe is our home, that we can feel safe on the deepest level of our being. In this mutual support, the sense of oneness that is the hallmark of the mystic is increasing. . . .

Mutual respect is the only possible foundation for a free, just, equal, and responsible society, and mystical experience is the ultimate ground for that respect. With freedom from the need to promote oneself—or one's nation, tradition, or religion—by devaluing others comes a great release of energy. What had been invested in protection is now available for caring for and rejoicing in others. [3]

### Senate report gives Canadian Christian charities top marks

OTTAWA -- Christian charities have praised a recent Senate report on the charities that affirmed religious organizations are an essential piece in serving charitable needs.

"They did far more than what we were hoping for," said John Pellowe, CEO of the Canadian Council of Christian Charities (CCCC). "In the report itself they make reference to the great benefit of advancing religion."

Pellowe noted that Senators went even further in describ-

ing the positive role religion plays in Canada during a press conference June 20 after after the publication of the report.

Responding to question from a reporter from *Le Devoir* on whether religion should be included since they seem to promote only themselves, Senator Terry Mercer, chair of the Special Senate Committee on the Charitable Sector, affirmed religion has a charitable purpose.

"Yes, they are promoting their own reli-

gion, but I think religion is a good thing," said Mercer. "It depends — and I'm not going to single out any particular religion —each person has a relationship with their god that is very personal and how they express that is important."

"Churches, synagogues, mosques have been the focal point in many communities; they have been the cement that's kept communities together," he said.

Senator Ratna Omidvar, deputy chair, added that religious institutions "do more than simply preserve their religious beliefs."

"They extend themselves in very significant ways, and we should appreciate and recognize that, as opposed to looking at whether they should qualify (for charitable status) or not," she said.



The committee retained the charity categories — "the relief of poverty, the advancement of education, the advancement of religion, and other purposes beneficial to the community in a way the law regards as charitable" in its June report entitled Roadmap to a Stronger Charitable Sector.

Pellowe cited research that shows the benefit of religion goes far beyond the mere spiritual benefits, "which the general public doesn't value."

> "What they have found is people who attend a place of worship once a week or more are very different from all other Canadians," he said. Those who attend less than weekly have different outcomes more similar to that of the general population, he added.

The weekly attenders or more have "have better mental health, better life outcomes because they are making choices more wisely," he said.

"People of Christian faith are other-

centred, focused on being on a community of other people," he said. "The others may not be other Christians. They feel responsibility towards other. This makes them more generous and more likely to volunteer.

"Stats Canada data on giving and volunteering reveals that religious people support secular charities more than nonreligious people do, greatly increasing the support that the non-religious have available to them," Pellowe said.

The Senate committee was struck in January 2108 to examine the charitable and non-profit sector that accounts for more than seven per cent of Canada's gross domestic product and employs more than two million people, according to the report, which estimated there are 86,000 registered charities and another 85,000 non-profit organizations providing public benefits.



"The charitable and non-profit sector has suffered from benign neglect for too long. Legal rules have been reformed in a piecemeal fashion; task force recommendations have gone unimplemented; and kind words have all too often served as a substitute for meaningful action. The time for real change has come.

The committee made 42 recommendations to shore up the sector, among them: ways to encourage volunteers, seeking diversity on boards, and study whether to increase the tax benefit of charitable donations.

According to a Cardus 2016 report on a charity roundtable, 18 per cent of Canadians give 80 per cent of common good resources. The Senate report shows most giving is done by those over age 55. As this cohort grows older, charitable giving is shrinking.

Milton Friesen, Cardus program director of social cities, said the Senate report signals the definition of charity and the role of religion is "a matter for ongoing debate."

"We need to understand what generates volunteering and donating much better than we do now," he said, noting that if it declines "you can't just put it back" by increasing tax dollars or having the government step in.

"If giving has a social dimension, we need to figure out what social dimension leads to giving," Friesen said. He also noted the needs of large, government-funded charities such as educational and health institutions are very different from small, local charities with little or no paid staff.

The Canadian religious landscape is changing and religious diversity is increasing, he said. Religion has been traditionally a source of giving, and there is "some sense of decline," so the question is whether the "government going to pick up the slack" even if in some things "government is not well positioned to take over."

Under Friesen, Cardus initiated the ongoing Halo project in 2016 that examined the impact of program spending by religious communities. It revealed for every dollar a congregation spends, the wider community receives a benefit worth \$4.77.

#### Council Activities Update: Council Retreat in Canmore

Summertime is often a period when church activities slow down with people off on travelling, camping, picnicking and other adventures. Council activities often slow down as well, but less so than you might think!

Council continues to leverage the set of processes outlined by LEAD (waytolead.org) and are one quarter of the way done this three to four-year program. We are currently wrapping up the "Tune In" process, which focusing on listening, a shift from inward to outward, and experimentation. We are currently preparing to engage in the "Wake up" process (establishing purpose and values, mission, identity). Future processes are the Work out" process (hospitality, diversity, understanding, comfort zones) and the "Dig Down" process (deepen theology, streamline systems, stewardship).

An outcome of the LEAD program is the development of a three-year strategic plan. While we are working through the steps towards defining this plan, we are taking steps to ensure forward movement.

To that end, a Council retreat was held in Canmore on the weekend of August 10 (with thanks to Faye Larsen for providing the location!). The retreat was a spiritual journey focused on our congregation using the LEAD Annual Roadmap to clarify values, identify stakeholders, name strengths, identify opportunities, articulate aspirations, articulate results, and develop related communication plans. Note that "stakeholders" in this context refers to a person who has an interest in, or is affected by, an action. This definition is intended to move us toward an outward call, remembering all those who have a stake in sharing and receiving the Gospel.

A working set of values to guide are focus was developed, specifically:

- Worship nurtures people's faith
- Address social concerns (help people in need)
- Build strong, healthy relationships
- Help our members live out their faith in their daily lives

These values were explored in addressing the needs of the following stakeholders along with results to pursue associated with each stakeholder, as follows:

#### People who are vulnerable

- Community Kitchen to provide training to families regarding practical food preparation instruction and hands-on experience in making meals. Leadership for this includes Sasha Craven and will be in collaboration with, and clientele from, the Calgary Southwest Communities Resource Centre (swcrc.ca)
  Congregational members and groups
- Relationship Building Every-member Visitation to ensure congregational contact, conversation and engagement with all of our members. Leadership for this is from Dean Larsen, Council and the Wake-Up Process Team.

#### Turkish community and other faiths

Interfaith classes and spiritual field trips – to continue our efforts to work with faith groups and explore how God is working through us and others. Leadership for this is from the Pastors and Tammy Kozlowski

#### Young people and children

• Youth in Ministry – Leadership for this if from Pastor Phil and our youth leaders

#### Partner organizations

• Extend support for Calgary Alliance for the Common Good – continue fostering awareness of, and extend participation in, community initiatives through CACG (calgarycommongood.org). Leadership for this will be from Pastor Phil, Ryan Andersen, Gates Fortier and Archie Wells.

Further information on these desired results and how they will be achieved will be forthcoming in the fall. In the meantime, please feel free to address any questions you might have to Council or the people identified above.

The Calgary Alliance for the Common Good is a non-partisan and non-profit alliance of congregations, unions, school and community groups in Calgary representing more than 30,000 people. These organizations came together to form the Calgary Alliance for the Common Good in order to organize the power of our communities to shape a just and compassionate city.

The mission of the Calgary Alliance for the Common Good is:

- To create a broad-based shared organization that is as diverse as Calgary, building relationships among organizations and people from the various community, ethnic, non-profit, labour, and religious groups.
- To strengthen our member organizations and their leaders to develop a healthy and effective civic life. To use the principles and techniques of community organizing to effectively address the real issues facing Calgarians and our member organizations.

Even though the alliance changed its name from the *Metro Alliance for the Common Good* to the *Calgary Alliance for the Common Good* to ver 10 years ago, the alliance itself has been around for over 10 years. About four years ago, the Calgary Alliance made the decision to hire a community organizer, Ryan Andersen, in order to grow and develop its capacity to fulfil on its mission. Since then, it has grown from a handful of institutions to almost 30 institutions now. Lutheran Church of the Cross is one of them.

The **Founding Assembly** on October 17 is an opportunity to claim and celebrate the strides CACG has made and to publicly establish itself as a voice working for the good of all Calgarians. When the City of Calgary announced \$60 million - \$120 million over a year - in cuts to services, The Calgary Alliance for the Common Good launched the #KeepCalgaryStrong campaign and invited others to join in. Together we got a reaction that preserved many essential services for Calgarians, especially those who are most vulnerable.

Thank you to everyone involved in

the <u>#KeepCalgaryStrong</u>Campaign. We saw results! The Seniors Program was saved. The Mental Health Strategy will go forward, The Low Income Transit pass is funded by the city. Great work by everyone who was involved.

### A Message from Our Bishop

#### Dear Beloved of God -

I have been in a reflective mood as of late. Perhaps it is because I am preparing this article at the beginning of August with some holiday time behind me and fall just over the horizon of my computer screen. Perhaps it is because on July 9 I celebrated thirty years of ordained ministry.

Time has flown by. I was ordained in my home congregation. Valhalla Lutheran Church, Valhalla Centre, Alberta. Yes, a Norwegian settlement with a handful of Germans sprinkled in this farming community.

Following ordination I have been blessed to serve, together with my wife, Cathy, with and among the people of Bethany Lutheran Church, Dickson (1989-1993), Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Lethbridge (1993-2002), Ascension Lutheran Church, Edmonton (2002-2010), as Assistant to the Bishop (beginning August 2010), and as Bishop (since January 26, 2013).

Within my time as Bishop, and certainly over the thirty years, there has been significant change, however, I continue to live by three core values which I first named while at College: servant leadership, affirmation and involvement while seeking to engage, empower and equip the people of God.

Each year I seek to take time to reflect on this calling. Over these summer months I have been pondering, reflecting and writing about these thirty years, both the joys and the challenges.

Since 2013 I continue to return to a writing Cathy and I commissioned from Deacon Dr. Faith Nostbakken for my ordination as Bishop.

In shaping the poem, which Faith read during the Ordination, she considered the texts for the worship, the

hymns selected for congregational song and ensemble singing, as well as a handful of images, metaphors and pastoral themes which are deeply meaningful to me.

#### The poem is titled: Ordination.

Nobody asks for drowning, certainly not the infant gently tilted head towards the font, arms and legs splayed suddenly with fear, maybe a whimper or a shrill cry as the robed one sifts through the sparkling water and touches the tiny brow, barely downy with hair, the rhythm of "The Father. . . and of the Son . . . and of the Holy Spirit" incanted before a finely woven linen cloth dabs away the drops. Everyone so easily forgets that dying can begin like this, the cross fingered again on the forehead at the dawn of each new day.

Nobody asks to have her feet washed either, not on Maundy Thursday even, unless her shoes are polished, her stockings free of runs and easily removed, her toenails trimmed and filed that very morning. Maybe then she offers but can't quite face the eyes of the one who silently lifts her foot from the basin, wraps it awkwardly in a freshly laundered towel, drying the creases between each toe. Most would rather forget how almost embarrassing it is to be served this way by a neighbor or a friend much less the One incarnated in this sacred, tender act. Nobody asks to be called into paradox either when the people proclaim, "You lead!" and in the same voice add, "You serve!" our meanings translated into as many tongues as join in song and blessing on this day. Wash my feet, but don't embarrass me. Splash my head with the font's damp cross but don't let me stay in the drowning. As you shepherd, walk beside us; notice how cracked our feet really are, how chapped our hands, and whenever we meet eye-to-eye, (especially try to meet us there) call us brother, sister, as we are yours, and remind us, so we don't forget, of the wondrous ache and splendor of love made whole first by being broken, made new first by dying, made perfect by the One whose body here and now we are, heads, hands, feet, eyes, tongues and all.

Blessings as you enter the fall season...see you at Area Gatherings.
