Last Saturday at the South West Area gathering of the Lutheran churches, the leaders gathered were invited to discuss the question: What is the spiritual wound we see in Calgary? Almost every group included this answer: Lack of community.

Today as I write this article, fresh in my mind is the impassioned plea by Greta Thunberg before the UN for world leaders to find a way to work together for the sake of the environment.

These are such big problems, how can I even begin to make a difference?

It is easy to get overwhelmed.

We believe in a God who is faithful and who can work miracles. This same God also calls us to and empowers us for a life of love and service to God and our neighbor. Individually, we can each make a little difference, but when we work together, these efforts are multiplied.

Last Spring when the Calgary Alliance for the Common Good was listening to Calgarians to identify the urgent issues facing Calgarians, they heard the same things that

are mentioned above. Together, the Calgary Alliance decided to focus on *Mental Health* and *Social Isolation* as its new foci while continuing to work on Indigenous/Non-indigenous reconciliation and supporting seniors. Additionally, the alliance is supporting the *Climate Hub* in its efforts to gather Calgarians together to talk about the environment AND keeping our economy healthy.

As I participate in our partnership with Jews, Muslims, union workers, ordinary citizens and other Christians through the Calgary Alliance, I continue to experience the hopefulness and possibility that comes from working together for common goals. What I am present to is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness and self-control. Do those sound familiar?

On **Thursday, October 17** at 7pm at Knox United Church, CACG is having its Founding Assembly. This is a celebration of the work that the alliance been doing to give voice to average Calgarians and a launching of what's possible in the future.

I invite you to come and see for yourself what it feels like to work together to make a difference.



Religion and politics

As Christians, we should be proud to bring a faith perspective to the upcoming federal election.

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CAN RELIGION AND POLITICS EVER MIX?

For many Canadians trying to make sense out of the current federal election, adding religion to the mix would only make matters worse. It conjures up images of the latest episode of *The Handmaid's Tale* (2011) or certain American politicians (usually with pronounced Southern drawls) using their supposed love of Jesus to justify reactionary and cruel policies.

They have a point. No one, even the most devout among us, wants to live in a society dominated by a particular religion intent on forcing its views upon believers and non-believers alike.

PEOPLE OF FAITH

At the same time, our Christian faith should help define us. It calls on us to love our neighbour as ourself, make sacrifices for the good of all and be stewards of creation.

Christian principles of love, justice and honesty in our dealings with others are supposed to be guiding principles for everything we do.

Is it fair to ask people of faith to leave this crucial part of their identity behind when they get involved in politics as a voter, activist or even a candidate?

As a person of faith who spent most of my life in politics, including serving as an Ontario cabinet minister, I have struggled with this question. Now, as the director of the Centre for Public Ethics at Martin Luther University College, I have had the opportunity to reflect on the matter from a different perspective.

My conclusion? I firmly believe that faith can play a positive role in our political system while still respecting the secular nature of our society. There is no need to check it at the door.

Indeed, as Christians, we should be proud to bring a faith perspective to the upcoming federal election.

A DISCLAIMER

I must add a disclaimer. I admit that religion doesn't always have the greatest track record when it comes to political involve-

ment. Faith can become weaponized.

Claims of a political endorsement from the Almighty can be used to divide people, exclude or even demonize certain groups and undermine the very values that Christianity is supposed to represent.

The role that our churches played in establishing and operating our nation's residential schools represents a dark hour for the mixture of faith and public policy.

Yes, there is bad religion out there. However the answer to bad religion, to paraphrase American Christian activist James Wallis—isn't no religion—it's better religion.

GOOD RELIGIOUS VOICES

Good religious voices have something to offer our political debates—not as the final word on the subject, because they

There are also lots of us out there. Although church attendance may be dropping in some quarters, there are still many Canadians who either identify with a faith tradition or consider themselves open to God and spirituality.

A DIFFERENT AGENDA

Faith communities are different from other interest groups. While labour unions advocate for their members and the Chamber of Commerce stands up for the business community, people of faith have a much different agenda. It is one that moves the focus away from their personal demands and shines the spotlight on the other—particularly the poor and marginalized.

This is important. We live in a world full of very loud voices whose success often appears tied to their ability to shock

claim status as God's official spokespeople
—but as equal voices in our public
discourse.

Faith communities and people of faith have a long history of involvement in progressive issues going back to the fight against slavery, advocating for workers' rights and their central role in the American civil rights movement.

Here in Canada, it was churches that worked alongside Indigenous communities to fight against the Mackenzie Valley Pipeline, developed a system that allows for the private sponsorship of refugees, fought for the preservation of medicare, helped lead Canadian opposition to Apartheid in South Africa and challenged the unfairness of our economic system.

More recently, think of the role that faith communities played in welcoming thousands of Syrian refugees to our nation.

us, entertain us or convince us that the system is ripping us off. In the midst of all this noise, it is often very difficult for those struggling to be heard.

During my time in office I remember when our local newspaper asked a number of high-profile citizens to live on the equivalent of social assistance for several weeks—giving the story of their struggles considerable prominence.

After the series finished, the reporter called to ask whether our office had been inundated with calls demanding reform of the system. As someone concerned with poverty issues, it was my unhappy task to tell her that we had only received two calls —and one of them was hers.

That has real public policy implications.
A politician may feel passionate about social justice issues but if no one is raising it when they knock on voters' doors or in

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their constituency office, it is difficult to convince those at the top to make it a focus of activity. Politicians tend to be fairly simple animals. Their constituents' priorities become their priorities.

BELIEFS ENCOURAGE ADVOCACY

That is where people of faith come in. Their beliefs encourage them to advocate for issues that are not receiving the attention they deserve: poverty; the plight of refugees and newcomers; right relations with our Indigenous communities and our responsibility as stewards of creation.

As well as giving a voice to the voiceless, faith can also encourage people to swim against the current—to challenge conventional thinking and stand up against a world that at times seems to have lost its way.

Let's be honest. As a society we do seem to be a little lost these days.

Think of our political parties. What exactly do they stand for?

Oh sure, as we head towards election day we all enjoy debating the strengths and weaknesses of each of the party leaders (with a particular accent on the weaknesses). We make fun of their gaffes, roll our eyes at their overblown rhetoric and study those polling questions that ask, "Which party leader would you most like to have a beer with."

But do we ever reflect upon what values guide them and their party? How do they see the world and their role within it? What do they believe we owe each other and how can government help us to live up to that responsibility?

That kind of crazy talk may seem out of place in our day and age. If you listen to much contemporary political chatter, you get the impression that our ultimate goal as a society is to create a world where everyone is free to do what they want, as long as they are nice about it.

SEEING THE WORLD IN A BROADER CONTEXT

Faith can help us see the world in a much broader context and gives our presence on earth significant meaning and purpose. As Rabbi Harold Kushner put it in his 1989 book, *Who Needs God*, even if religion "can't change the facts about the world we live in... it can change the way we see those facts, and that in itself can often make a real difference."

As a result, faith inspires us to demand more from our politicians. We are about to elect the next prime minister of Canada, a person with extraordinary power over the future of our country. They will face crucial decisions that no one can anticipate.

Faith helps us look beyond each party's shopping list of promises and determine whether they have a consistent worldview based on compassion, justice and hope.

When I speak of a role for faith communities in the political process, I realize that things have changed. Churches are no longer part of the establishment. The bishop can't simply have a quiet word with the prime minister to steer the ship of state in a particular direction.

This "outsider" status creates new opportunities to build a more grass roots approach to influencing public policy. When we are all outsiders, interfaith co-operation is much easier, as we work to find common ground and rally troops from a variety of faith traditions to the cause.

So how do you bring your faith to the political process, particularly the upcoming federal election?

BE INFORMED

First, you need to be informed. The lead up to the election is already proving to be nasty and polarizing; full of personal attacks and drive-by smears. Accusations are flying back and forth. Each side would have you believe that their opponent's victory would set our country on a course for disaster.

Tune out the noise. Try to gain a better understanding of the key issues of the election.


Go to an all-candidates meeting and ask questions. Study party platforms and policy statements. They are all online.

And remember, we live in a complex world where there are few easy solutions to the challenges facing our society. Don't be swayed by those claiming they have all the answers.

Voting is the ultimate expression of citizenship and an important responsibility we should take as Christians.

Realize that it's also not simply about policy positions. Governments have very limited time, resources and energy. Try to understand where some of these crucial issues fall on a party's To-Do List if they were to get elected.

As you become informed, ask yourself an important question. To what extent do the policy positions of various parties align with my faith? I admit this is not an easy exercise.

It involves coming to terms with the way you understand Christ's teachings and their relevancy in our modern world. Although no party or candidate will tick every box, faith provides an important perspective to judge a party or candidate.

GET INVOLVED

Second, get involved. In a world where people are increasingly disengaged from politics, it is crucial that more of us support the best candidate. Knock on doors, deliver flyers and yes, even make a donation.

Get your friends and neighbours involved. Help mobilize your church to hold sessions with candidates, advocate for key issues and raise awareness of all that is at stake in the upcoming vote. Take advantage of the election resources put together by groups like the Canadian Council of Churches or Citizens for Public Justice.

Work with others to form what my colleague at the Centre for Public Ethics, Lutheran thinker Rev. Dr. David Pfrimmer calls "Publics." He explains that these are "voluntary associations of individuals gathered around an idea, purpose or action and who in the process are changed while at the same time changing their context."

Run for office. Although it may be too late for this election, we need people of faith in elected office. Not only does a faith perspective help give voice to what is important, but it provides an important anchor in a world where you often find yourself hanging on by your fingernails.

While in office I found my faith a great comfort. Praying, studying scripture and reflecting on the teachings of my religion helped me make important policy decisions. In a world where the idea of "winning at all costs" is everywhere, it often established lines of behaviour that I wouldn't cross.

It also reminded me that we are all sisters and brothers in the eyes of God and helped me see the dignity in everyone—the poor, marginalized and those hurling insults as they protested outside of my office.

USE YOUR FAITH

As the federal election campaign heats up, use your faith in other ways.

In a world that is polarized, frustrated and angry, elections can bring out the worst in our country. Too many of us have built walls to shield ourselves against opposing views. Convinced of the rightness of our cause we seek to vilify the other side and become warriors for a certain set of beliefs.

This is a dangerous way to run elections. Beyond its ugliness, an outcome that leaves smug winners and beaten up losers will make it even more difficult for the party that gets elected to govern.

Faith allows us to breathe—to be thankful for the many blessings we have received. No matter how big the problems facing our country, Canada is a magnificent nation and we have much to celebrate.

You might be pleasantly surprised at what a positive difference a mindset like that makes when thinking about the upcoming election.

Faith calls us to recognize our own failings. Belief in something greater than

ourselves forces us to tone down the self-righteousness and admit that none of us has it all figured out. We realize that our position is not necessarily the last word on the subject.

Faith encourages us to recognize the value in what others have to say. It asks us

to listen more and not be afraid to be selfcritical.

Remember, it was Jesus who told us to remove the beam in our own eye in order to help our neighbour see the speck in their eye.

Yes, there are hate mongers and extremists who should not be tolerated and by all means call them out.

But that still leaves many other view-points that need to be considered. A willingness to put some water in their wine and work with other political parties should be something we value in a candidate for office—not see it as a sign of weakness.

People of faith can perform another role in our political discourse. They can hold others who claim a religious perspective to account. We have all witnessed the ease in which people can twist the teachings of Christ to divide people, feed prejudice and foment hate. Ironically, it is often other religious voices who are best positioned to call these people out. They have the credibility to point out the true nature of Jesus' teachings.

Finally, faith demands that we be civil to each other. I don't simply mean polite. Civility is much more than refraining from name calling.

It involves the recognition that we are all in this together. No matter how much we may disagree with our political foes, they are God's creation and we have an obligation to treat them with respect and fellowship.

When it comes to politics, where the "other side" is so often characterized as the enemy, that is not always easy.

However, in my experience, the vast majority of people who put their names on the ballot are sincere individuals who truly want to see our country strengthened and are willing to make tremendous personal sacrifices.

I cringe when I hear people arrogantly proclaim that elections are about "choosing the least-worst candidate."

VOTE

This brings us to voting. This is the ultimate expression of citizenship and an important responsibility we should take as Christians. Make your choice wisely and find the time to mark your ballot. There is little excuse for missing the vote.

Maybe try something different this election. Instead of seeing your choice as the lesser of all the evils, why not think about it as choosing the best among a group of good individuals who want to make a better country?

None of them may be perfect. But neither are we.

Creating Peaceful Change By Richard Rohr

The following is the daily devotion for Sunday, August 18, 2019 from the Center for Action and Contemplation .It is part of that week's theme, "Nonviolence." As we head into another election cycle, it is good to contemplate how to relate to those who have differences of opinion with us.

The root of violence is the illusion of separation—from God, from being one with oneself and everything else, and from Being Itself. When we don't know how to consciously live out of union (which is called love), we resort to violence, fighting anything that is not like us and that we cannot control. Contemplative practice teaches us to honor differences and also realize that we are all much more than our nationality, skin color, gender, or other labels which are all aspects of the passing and thus false self. Contemplation brings us back to our True Self, who we are in God.

When we can become little enough, naked enough, and honest enough, then we will, ironically, find that we are more than enough. This is the wisdom of the Gospel that is especially emphasized in Franciscan spirituality. At this place of both poverty and freedom we have nothing to prove or protect. Here we can connect with everything and everyone. Everything belongs. This cuts violence at its very roots before there is any basis for fear, anger, vengeance, or self-promotion—the things that often cause violence.

One of the reasons I founded the Center for Action and Contemplation thirty-two years ago was to give activists some grounding in spirituality (their True Self) so they could continue working for social change, but from a stance much different than anger, ideology, or oppositional willpower. Many activists I knew in the 1960s loved the nonviolent teachings of Jesus, Mohandas Gandhi (1869–1948), and Martin Luther King, Jr. (1929–1968). But it became clear to me that theirs was often a mere intellectual appreciation rather than a participation in the much deeper mystery.

To create peaceful change, we first have to get the "Who" right. Who are you? Most of us, particularly pragmatic Americans, lead with strategic questions—what, how, when. These are secondary questions. Before we act or react, we need to wait—wait for communion, wait until we're reconnected to the Ground of Being and even in our "enemies," wait until we're conscious, wait until a "yes" appears within us.

When we begin by connecting with our inner experience of communion, our actions can be pure, clear, and firm. This kind of action, rooted in one's True Self, comes from a deeper knowing of what is real, good, true, and beautiful—beyond labels and dualistic judgments of right or wrong. From this place, our energy is positive and has the most potential to create change for the good. This stance is precisely what we mean by "being in prayer" and why we must pray always to maintain this state of constant prayer.

I'm not telling you *not* to act. The Gospel offers a way to make our action sustainable and lasting over the long haul. People on the Right tend to be perpetually angry, fearful, and overly defensive, and people on the Left tend to be perpetually cynical, morally righteous, and outraged. The Gospel calls forth a refined instrument beyond these two falsehoods that can really make a difference because it is a new level of consciousness altogether. Such activists are themselves "a new creation" (Galatians 6:15) and the lightning rods of God's transformative energy into the world.

Gateway to Presence:

If you want to go deeper with today's meditation, take note of what word or phrase stands out to you. Come back to that word or phrase throughout the day, being present to its impact and invitation.

2019 Budget Performance to August 31

The attached spreadsheet details ELCOC's General Revenue and Expenses for the period January 1, 2019 through August 31, 2019. Offerings to designated/pass through funds and special offerings to the mortgage are NOT included in this budget comparison. Please note the following:

- Income and expenses were sourced from monthly income and expense statements generated by our Power Church software.
- With the exception of a minor difference in February the revenue figures quoted here match those reported by the Financial Secretary for the same period.
- The YTD Budget figures were sourced from Power Church and in most cases represent two thirds of the Annual 2019 Budget as we have completed two thirds of the calendar year.
- The 2019 Annual Budget figures were sourced from the 2018 Annual Report.
- I noticed that the TOTAL EXPENSES reported in the 2019 Budget Document is not the exact sum of the estimated expenses \$401,994 vs my total of \$401,064.
- The 2019 Annual Budget as printed in the 2018 Annual Report does not include allowance for the \$500/
 month transfer to the Major Maintenance Dedicated Fund.
- The Surplus/(Deficit) quoted in the 2019 Annual Budget is (\$11,994). My calculated 2019 Budget Deficit using the estimated income and expenses plus allowing for the \$500/month transfer is (\$13,064)
- As of the end of August our income to expense imbalance is (\$32,877). Our offering income is some \$39,907 under budget and our expenses are some \$16,975 under budget.
- The General Revenue reported by the Financial Secretary for the September through December period in 2017 and 2018 was \$139,685 and \$158,483 respectively for an average of \$149,084. Projecting 2019 General Revenue using the actual to August 31 and this average yields \$373,247. Assuming 2019 expenses come in as budgeted the projected deficit for 2019 is \$33, 817.
- While our current deficit position is not ideal, over-all the congregation is in a strong financial position.
 We also have the remaining four months of the calendar year to increase offerings as it appears we have a revenue problem rather than an expense problem.



Putting Our Gardens to Sleep

The weather during this 2019 gardening season has been full of surprises, but in the end gave us a bountiful lowed. Our own rose garden which graces the peace harvest from the vegetable patch.

After an initial offering of samples of chard and beans after a worship service at the beginning of August, we went straight into five weekly deliveries to the Food

er in the garden—was green beans. We plant a pole bean variety called Emerite that has never failed us.

Our boxes of beans, turnips, onions, carrots, beets, chard, potatoes and zucchini were received with thanks from the Food Bank volunteers who

came out to help us unload. Although relatively speaking, a 40 ft x 40 ft garden plot cannot feed a village, it was good to know that each delivery probably provided fresh produce for at least 10 families. Never once have we questioned whether the labour we expend on this garden is worthy.

The vegetable patch is now clear of all but parsnips

which we will leave until a first frost sweetens them.

The roses everywhere in the city appreciated

the early deluges of rain and the warm sun that folpoles was at its most exceptional ever.

Some watering issues gave us a less than uniform coverage of bloom in the Remembering Garden, but that heart full of purple and pink blossoms was the same Bank. Our earliest crop—and probably the best produc-rich honouring of victims of violence that it has been

for the past ten years.


Now the clean-up of the flower gardens begins, and with luck those beds will be ready for next spring by the end of September.





A Message from Our Bishop

Dear Beloved of God -

I give thanks to God for...

In January 2016 I stood with ELCIC and ELCA bishop colleagues at the border between Nogales, Arizona, and Nogales, Mexico. We were silenced by the high, seemingly impenetrable metal wall that separated not only countries, but cities, neighbourhoods, friends and families.

And so I was fascinated this summer when news reported what seemed like an ordinary scene: children and adults playing on bright, hot-pink seesaws, laughing and chatting with each other. But this scene filmed at the end of July was a playground unlike any other, for these custombuilt seesaws had been placed through the slatted steel border fence that separates the United States and Mexico.

The idea for this "Teeter-Totter Wall" came from Ronald Rael, an architecture professor at the University of California, Berkeley, and Virginia San Fratello, a professor of design at San Jose State University — and it was a long time coming. In 2009, the two designed a concept for a binational seesaw at the border, and ten years later, their conceptual drawings became reality. The "Teeter-Totter Wall" featured three pink seesaws installed between the slats on the border fence, allowing people on both sides of the border to see and to play with each other.

The seesaws were fabricated by a group of artists and the project was realized with help from Colectivo Chopeke, which focuses on bringing communities together through design. Rael and his crew transported the colourful seesaws to Sunland Park, New Mexico, which is separated by a steel fence from Ciudad Juárez, Mexico. Sunland Park is also where many migrants have been detained this year.

In an Instagram post (July 29, 2019) Rael wrote that the event was "filled with joy, excitement, and togetherness at the borderwall. The wall became a literal fulcrum for U.S.-Mexico relations and children and adults were connected in meaningful ways on both sides, with the recognition that the actions that take place on one side have a direct consequence on the other side."

Rael and San Fratello, speaking to Forbes Media, said: "The seesaw demonstrates how those immediate relationships between people can create an environment where happiness and play are also important aspects of life on the border and that our relationships with our neighbors can extend past political relationships but also humanistic relationships."

Word of the installation spread quickly across social media, but as quickly as the seesaws went up, they came down equally fast.

"There is no playground along the U.S.-Mexico border wall in New Mexico," a customs and border patrol official is quoted by Forbes Media as saying. "On the evening of July 28, U.S. Border Patrol agents encountered a small group who identified themselves as local university faculty/staff at the border wall. They had placed boards through the wall and appeared to be playing with residents of Mexico while recording the engagement. The group removed the boards and left the area without incident after it was established that there was no advance coordination."

I remain fascinated by this report, this experience, this play. The wall, which I had seen only as an impenetrable metal barrier, had become a fulcrum to create meaningful connections on both sides as the hot-pink seesaws went up and down.

Though the wall still separates the two countries and their people, the alternate life given it by professors and artists is profound. This was an image of community and relationships, and a striking contrast to the heart-wrenching scenes that now fill the news.

Joy, excitement, togetherness.

I give thanks to God for artists, architects, poets, musicians, playwrights, actors, dancers and theologians who open our eyes to hope and possibility, and to a vision to see beyond the barriers that separate us, creating meaningful connections.
