



Pray always. Do not lose heart.

The above words are a gift to us from the Gospel of Luke in his preface to Jesus' story about the persistence widow and the unjust judge in Luke 18: "Then Jesus told [the disciples] a parable about their need to pray always and to not lose heart..."

Pray Always. When we think of praying, what often comes to mind first is the prayer we say together each Sunday, The Lord's Prayer. Since we say it every Sunday, it is easy to pass over the significance of each of the petitions in it. In particular, there is a real depth to the petition, Your kingdom come. Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven. This prayer is an expression of our desire to have God's will done on earth. Even more personally, it is the prayer that our will may be aligned with God's will.

This is a major part of prayer. Prayer is not only a series of requests that we make to God, it is also an openness to God's communication with us and an ongoing attempt to align our thoughts, desires and will with God's. When we are called to "pray always," I don't think it means we should constantly be reciting the Lord's Prayer. I think it is more about the intention and practice of trying to discern God's will in the thousands of decisions we are making every day. It is developing the practice of asking in each moment, What is God's will in this time and place with these people and how might I act and speak aligned with that?

Do not lose heart. The word heart in Latin is cour. It is the root of the word courage which literally translates as heart action. To not lose heart then means to not be discouraged but to be courageous... to take heart action. This is no small order these days. There are lots of things that seem out of control and headed in the wrong direction: the economy, jobs, addictions, violence, wars, social isolation, racism, bigotry, climate change, uncivility, abuse, mental health... I wish the list stopped there but it doesn't. What more evidence do we need to be discouraged and to give up hope?

Yet, we believe in a God who brings hope out of despair and life out of death. We know a God whose very essence is love and who desire for the world is shalom, a life-giving peace and well-being for all. In the midst of this seemingly out of control world, we are called to believe in and trust God and God's de

sire for the world. We are called pray always (align our hearts and minds with God's) and to not lose heart (be courageous and take heart action).

Some crazy promises. On Sunday, Oct. 27th, **Kim Reath and Jamie Risse** are being confirmed. They are going to stand in front of the congregation and make some crazy promises. They will be asked,

- Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in holy Baptism:
- to live among God's faithful people,
- to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper,
- to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed,
- to serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and
- to strive for justice and peace in all the earth?

And they will answer, *I will and I ask God to help and guide me.*

They are crazy to make these promises. But in doing so, they join the rest of us gathered who have made those same crazy promises. The promise to live as people of hope, service and love. The promise to live as people who resist all the enticements to put our faith in something else and to be focused on God.

The promise to live as people who pray always and do not lose heart.

The parable of the persistent widow and unjust judge ends with Jesus asking the question, When the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?

The answer is YES thanks to people like Kim and Jamie and you and me who make promises to be people of faith and then back it up with our actions.

Pray always. Do not lose heart.

Coexistence: Beliefs and Experience

The following is the daily devotion for Monday, October 14, 2019 from the Center for Action and Contemplation. It is part of that week's theme, "Ways of Knowing." Around Reformation Sunday (10/27), we are reminded of some of the paradoxes of Lutheran theology. In particular, simul justus et peccator—simultaneously saint and sinner— emblematic of the both/and-ness of our beliefs. This devotion embraces this both/and around the idea of faith be both head and heart.

We cannot know God only by thinking thoughts. Unfortunately, for much of Christianity, faith largely became believing statements to be true or false (intellectual assent) instead of giving people concrete practices so they could themselves know how to open up (faith), hold on (hope), and allow an infilling from another source (love). Contemplation opens our heads, hearts, and bodies to God's living presence.

Over the last couple weeks, I shared about my own Franciscan order. Benedictines, who follow the Rule of St. Benedict (c. 480–547), are another Catholic order that often emphasizes practical, experiential spirituality. During one homily, Brother Michael, a member of the Benedictine monastic community of Weston Priory in Vermont, reflected on the day's Scripture readings (1 Corinthians 3:1-9; Luke 4:38-44):

What I heard Paul saying, basically, was that although he has preached, there was something more for the Corinthians than simply listening to preaching. It was their actual experience of believing. And I think Paul was trying to ask them really the question: what do you believe?

I think that's such an open question for ourselves right now, when there's a lot of information, a lot of preaching, a lot of answers given to us. But the same basic question remains: what is our experience of our beliefs?

For myself that was the real window into the Gospel today that talks about the miracle stories of Jesus. These stories are not about the suspension of natural laws. The Gospel writers are trying to tell us that something new was happening. I think that Jesus was somehow able to wake people up, to cure them and heal them of their dis-ease. I think that there was something in his message; the reign of God is close at hand. What does that mean? What does that experience signify for us? I think it brings it right into our own time, into our life together. Trying to move into our experience of believing, of living, of loving, and finding within it, within the many challenges, that that's where our hearts are fully engaged.

Maria Guarino reflects on Brother Michael's message:

It may seem radical for a man in a Christian vocation to call the literal truth of the miracle stories into question, but this is exactly the kind of grounding . . . spoke[n] to in [his] reflections. Just as [another] admonished his monks to take the Rule of Benedict very seriously but not to take it literally, so the brothers took matters of spirituality, scripture, and faith very seriously but with an open-mindedness grounded in the immediate reality of experience. . . . As in all aspects of the Benedictine life, there is a balance to be struck. . . . The brothers were open to mystery and the ineffable, but . . . the mysterious did not require suspension of the rational or the intellectual. For them, the rational mind and the spiritual heart coexist. Head and heart, rational and spiritual, need not stifle or silence one another. Both are necessary as the brothers position themselves toward an experience of God that is immediate yet distant, familiar yet ineffable, immanent yet transcendent, and as rational as it is unknowable.

Gateway to Presence:

If you want to go deeper with today's meditation, take note of what word or phrase stands out to you. Come back to that word or phrase throughout the day, being present to its impact and invitation.

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

In the next few months, Else contacted the Calgary Drop-In Center to determine the need, arranged for the purchase of bread and fillings, secured volunteers and funds to pay for the costs.

On the 1st WEDNESDAY OF NOVEMBER 1989, 12 loaves of sandwiches were made by the volunteers of the Wednesday Morning Bible Study Group. **That was 30 years ago.**

The Social Ministry Committee would like to recognize and thank Else for her years of devotion and work which has resulted in the continuous making of sandwiches for the Drop-In Center.



We would also like to recognize one of our driver, **Bill Ruecker**. Through Bill and Ruth's friendship with the owner and manager of the Douglasdale Tim Hortons, arrangements were made that on sandwich day, Bill would collect the left over DONUTS and BAKED GOODS from 3 or 4 Tim Hortons and deliver them to church for inclusion with the sandwiches delivery to the Drop-In Center. After approximately 20 years, Bill has retired. **Thank you Bill for your devoted pickups and delivery each month.**

Over the 30 years, we have had dozens and dozens of volunteer sandwich makers and drivers. Our project has expanded to **60 loaves of bread and/or buns** which are made each month. Many THANKS to all of you.

The Affirming Ministry Team has invited **Mr. Kelly Ernst** to speak during the 10:00 a.m. worship service. Kelly is Director, LBGTQ+ Programs at the Centre for Newcomers and is involved with the Calgary Rainbow Railroad Station.

The Calgary Rainbow Railroad Station assists refugees, persecuted in their home countries due to being LGBTQ+, to settle in Calgary after they have been assisted by the Rainbow Railroad, UNHCR, or the Canadian Government to flee unsafe countries. They help create sponsorship groups, find housing, food, clothing, language training, career development, and other things needed to get established in Calgary. These supports are provided through their volunteers or referrals to the Centre for Newcomers.

Please help make a difference in the lives of four refugees from Tanzania who recently arrived through the work of the Calgary Rainbow Railroad. As an Affirming congregation in the Affirming Network, we have an opportunity to participate and find winter clothing for them.

Two of these men come from a Lutheran church background in Tanzania and one, named Ibrahim, was brought to visit Church of the Cross in recent weeks. These men live in NW Calgary (Mount Pleasant) and we are also looking for a group of volunteers who might pick them up from their home and drive them to church once per month. About “First Contact,” a video project of the Aboriginal Peoples Television Network (APTN)

Canadians’ opinions about the Indigenous people of this country are formed without any knowledge of the culture’s true history or firsthand experience of the present-day communities. This may explain the prevalence of racist, unsympathetic and generally prejudicial attitudes that are often directed towards Indigenous peoples.

First Contact takes six Canadians on a 28-day journey intended to challenge these attitudes and shed a light on the true Indigenous experience. The travelers, all with ignorant views about Indigenous People, have been invited to leave their everyday lives behind and embark on a unique journey, travelling deep into the Indigenous communities throughout Canada including the nation’s capital, Algonquin Anishanabek Territory, Labrador, Saskatchewan and the Yukon. It is a journey that will challenge their perceptions and confront their prejudices about a world they never imagined they would see. This exploration of the true Indigenous experience in Canada will change the participants’ lives forever.



November 2019 Message for Congregations and Lay and Rostered Leaders

Dear Beloved of God –

Our Synod seeks to live out of four Mission Priorities reviewed and approved at our 2019 Synod Convention. One of these Mission Priorities is Collaborative Partnerships. Here, we say in part that, *“Listening to the Spirit’s leadership we are intentional in developing deeper relationships, sharing of resources, and partnership ministries within Areas of the Synod.”*

Together, in the Synod of Alberta and the Territories and across the ELCIC, we are experiencing several common realities: increased congregational vacancies, decreased congregational finances and participation, fewer pastoral graduates, to name a few. In the mist of these realities we continue to journey together seeking to discern God’s work in our communities and to join God in God’s mission.

With our Collaborative Partnerships Mission Priority in mind, as well as our current context, I invited 28 congregations, and lay and rostered leaders, to gather in three regions of the West and East Central Areas of our Synod in early October for a Collaborative Partnership Gathering. 23 out of 28 congregations were represented at the three regional gatherings.

October 1 – Bethel Lutheran, Camrose – over 60 participants representing 12 congregations

October 2 – Peace Lutheran, Leduc – over 30 participants representing 6 congregations

October 7 – Peace Lutheran, Innisfail – 53 participants representing 5 congregations

I am grateful for the presence of God’s Spirit among us and guiding us as we gathered. And, I am grateful for the participation of so many.

The goal of the evening was to kindle conversation and extend a call to further conversations and collaboration. The goal was to frame and reframe how we see ourselves: where are we at? what is our current reality? The goal of the evening was to engage in conversation sharing where God is at work, and where God is calling us to. The goal was to spark conversation about what journeying forward together might look like. The goal was to begin conversation and to continue these conversations at the upcoming Area Gatherings.

During each Gathering time was spent in prayer and in Dwelling in the Word considering John 21:1-14. What stands out for you in the text? a word? a phrase? What questions do you have of the text? Considering the gathering and current realities what might the Spirit of God be saying to us tonight?

Following the Collaborative Partnership Gathering at Peace Lutheran, Innisfail, Vivian Holtby, a member at Grace Lutheran, Wetaskiwin and a member of the West Central Area Leadership

Team forwarded this reflection on John 21:1-14 to me, as well as a picture. I share Vivian's reflection with her permission.

Lord, I'm so tired and I'm so weary, but I must go on you say.
So much loneliness, so much toil, so little fruit (fish)(people)(believers), so little hope! I came to fish in this night, for that is when fishing is good. The moon shines on the water on the left side of the boat so I cast there. The fish make themselves known as the light sparkles on their scales. But

tonight, there is no moon, so I/we don't see them. The light is not with us, the Light is not in us, not in me, not in Peter! It's not in the fish, the people.

You're watching us, waiting, seeing, knowing. You say, how do I bring you back to me?

So, you greet, you speak. You offer us insight, an idea, a way in, a way out, a way forward, a way to success, hope.

What is that hope- to feed and to be fed? To have strength and hope? To have friends travel the road with you? To have a purpose? To have You!

Ah, try something different today, tomorrow, tonight! Look on the untrod path, look to the least likely, look to the unknown, look inward, look outward,, look on the other side of the boat!

I looked elsewhere Lord, right close by, on the other side of the boat, fence, road, street, city, world. In my neighbour's yard!

I found 153, more or less, and I thought- what do I do now?

So, I brought them to breakfast with me! You were there waiting with your few. We sat in that place, there in the beach and we- those already there and those brought by me/us- breakfasted together.

I'm no longer tired, weary, lonely as I found a fisherman's net full of believers, just on the other side of the boat! Thank you, Lord, for leading me where I needed to go- out there in untried water, so to speak, so that I might find you and your people where you wanted me to find You and them!

Try the other side of the boat!
